Director's Notes

John Boynton Priestley was one of England's great writers -he was a member of the last generation of freethinking British "sages" who contemplated both science and philosophy in their literary output. He founded both the Common Wealth Party and the Campaign For Nuclear Disarmament (CND).

An Inspector Calls is considered to be one of Priestley's many 'Time Plays', so called because an alternative theory of time becomes the central metaphor or theatrical device of the play, the characters' lives being affected by how they react to the unusual temporal landscape they encounter. The play's time concept is believed to be based upon J W Dunne's "An Experiment with Time". Priestley builds upon these theories and hypothesises that time is somewhat more complicated than we have previously thought and that there is more than one dimension of time which result in humans experiencing a different quality of time, just as there is more than a single dimension of space, and that we can experience each type of time at different parts in our lives. This led him to an investigation of Dunne's theories of precognitive dreams ("memories of the future"), which Priestley had experienced some years back. Dunne's study was based on his own precognitive dreams. He concluded that many people have them without realising it, perhaps because they do not recall the details or fail to properly interpret the dream symbols.

Such theories, however, are always in danger of clouding what is taken to be Priestley's chief intention in writing the play - to show human social interconnectedness and the fragility of the human spirit in a world of booming capitalism, perhaps summed up in the inspector's final speech. Perhaps the most certain provenance of the Inspector is to be found in Priestley himself, whose socialist views find the perfect mouthpiece in the family's interloper. Written in 1945 right after the Second World War it demonstrates his attitude towards a human socialism that had no conception in the play's 1912 pre-Welfare State society.

Our hope is to bring you an interpretation that conveys through performance, set design and costume, both of these elements – a mergence of a dream like transcendence of time with Priestley's weighty socialist message "We are members of one body. We are responsible for each other". All that remains for you to do is to decide exactly who this Inspectre Ghoul is?
