TONIGHT'S MENU

Perhaps we should have called this evening's show "You're On Your Own" or "The Loneliness of the Long Distance Actor"? It is a thin line that separates a monologue (one person talking for a very long time) and a one-man show (one person talking for a very long time possibly with music and dance thrown in). With this in mind we have blurred the boundaries between the two by offering at the start of this evening an aperitif in the form of a "one man show" by Lindsay Stafford-Smith prior to the main course: three of the best "monologues" from Talking Heads.

Written for and presented on BBC TV in the late eighties, playwright Alan Bennett's Talking Heads were received by a delighted audience. Never before had such vivid writing exposed such depth of character and story by a single character talking to the camera. In the original TV series the professional actors recorded their monologues over a period of days, re-filming where necessary, and their stellar talent was of course more than evident in the finished However I believe without doubt, that faced with the task of performing the monologues live and uncut, it would have terrified the very best of them. The sheer rock-face the performers have scaled in terms of commitment, memory, talent, faith in themselves and you the audience cannot be underestimated and I thank every actor tonight for rising to that challenge It has crossed my mind that they could be;

Mad

Brave

Talented

Naive

Foolish

In fact they are all of the above.

I particularly wish to praise and thank Fiona Quilter-Wood, who stepped in at just over a months' notice to perform the role made famous by Julie Walters. 'Her Big Chance' is the wordiest of the monologues performed this evening and Fiona has proved herself to be the hero of the hour. I don't think even London cabbies could have absorbed all that text in such a short time!

Transferring Bennett's work to the stage threw up a number of challenges The balance between staying true to his original work and creating a theatre 'performance' was much discussed and we hope you enjoy the result.
